Fraser Mental Health	Fraser Mental Health provides counseling for children and adolescents with mental health concerns. We are the largest and most experienced provider of early childhood mental health services in Minnesota. Fraser offers evaluation, therapy, preschool day treatment and support services for children with a mental health diagnosis, including adjustment disorder, post-traumatic stress disorder, mood disorder, conduct disorder and attention deficit hyperactivity disorder. Metal roof decking will cover the non-secure side of the building, whereas precast plank will cover the detention side. CMU interior walls will be prevalent in the detention area along with ten prefabricated steel cell and toilet modules. The administrative side of the building will feature offices for the law enforcement, evidence and case file storage, a squad room, interview rooms, a law library and offices for county attorneys. The detention side will have individual holding cells and the minimum, dormitory style holding areas, an indoor recreation gym, dispatch and jail control areas, all emergency communication and operations, as well as a sallyport with accompanying intake and release areas. Consolidated Telephone Company (CTC)	The project being proposed by Consolidated Telephone Company (CTC) affects five areas within Crow Wing, Benton, and Cass counties in north central Minnesota. Currently, the 300+ homes and businesses in these rural areas do not have access to internet service for everyday needs and essential services. They are considered 100% unserved at this time. When this project is successfully completed, residents and businesses will have access to high-speed, reliable broadband internet with an efficient and productive speed of up to 1 Gigabit. Access to broadband is as imperative today as electricity was 75 years ago. This fiber-to-the-home project would enable residents to take advantage of educational opportunities and telehealth services that are not currently available to them. Chalkboard Collective Community	The Chalkboard Collective Community's vision is to repurpose the vacated BOLD Elementary School in Bird Island and create a 65,985 square foot multi-purpose property that will foster school sports, student learning, business expansion, community wellness, a deep winter greenhouse, and arts programs for Central Renville County. To achieve this vision, Chalkboard Community Collective needs to demolish parts of the school and prepare the site for occupancy. The original school building was erected in 1917 and was expanded in 1937 and 1956. The original 1917 building and part of the 1956 addition are unusable due to deferred maintenance. As a result, 41,340 square feet of the property, or 42%, needs to be demolished and made weather tight and usable in its existing condition.
